I am proud to say that seven generations of my family live, or have lived in Jacksonport. Beginning with my great-great grandfather John Bley who migrated here from Canada to harvest the forests with one of Jacksonport's first settlers and Jacksonport's namesake, Andrew Jackson.

I grew up in West Jacksonport with my grandparents, aunts and uncles, great aunts and uncles and cousins all around the town. The baseball field behind Bley's bar was a regular gathering place for the cousins and our friends who biked over to West Jacksonport to play ball. Idyllic as I think back on that time.

In first grade I attended the Fairview School in West Jacksonport, and as the country schools were consolidated, Carlsville and finally, Sevastopol School.

The majority of my work-life was in real estate — bank loan department, title company, assistant to real estate developer, and Realtor. It was a fun and interesting path. I suppose my affinity in real estate is a result of my heritage. My great great-grandfather John, and great grandfather Nick were not rich, but acquired land. Land enough that nearly each of Nick's children, as they married, received a farmstead. Some of those are still in the Bley family today.

I met my husband Bob, where else but at Bley's Bar. We lived in West Jacksonport and after a few years moved to what I call South Jacksonport. Our three children attended Zion Lutheran School and are graduates of Sevastopol High School—as are Bob and I, his parents and my mother. Our children were all able to return to Door County after college and a few years working outside Door County. They are each married and we have 7 grandchildren—six of which are or will be Sevastopol School graduates. Best of all, we all live on the same road on land that Bob's grandparents farmed!

I am a member of Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church in West Jacksonport and have enjoyed teaching Sunday School there over the years. I am a member of the Jacksonport Plan Commission, and in 2019 organized the town's 150th anniversary celebration along with a great committee. I was elected to the Sevastopol School Board in 2006, and have been president since 2017. We have excellent schools in Door County, but I of course think Sevastopol's the best and I am honored to continue to serve on that board. I currently serve on the committee planning Sevastopol's 100th anniversary.

The Jacksonport Historical Society is my newest venture and I look forward to helping to expand its programming and reach. My work on the town board and school board are for the future—to make our community and school even better—my historical society work is important to me because our past connects us to who we are and where we are now.

HISTORICAL MARKER

The Jacksonport Historical Society sponsored a historical marker about five years ago that was placed in front of St. Michael's Church in Jacksonport. Research completed and assembled by Les Kiehnau and further reviewed by the State, resulted in the plaque currently at the site. It's an interesting read

outlining the sites' history going back to the 1650s with the Catholic affiliated French explorers as well as the families that helped develop the current church building starting in the 1870s. The plaque, in addition to the recently renovated church interior which incorporates many of the 1870s design components, is worth visiting. Thank you to Les Kiehnau and Eileen (Birnschein) Roberts, whose efforts have been instrumental in completing this project.

The plaque reads: St. Michael the Archangel. French trader Medard Chouart des Groseilliers spent the winter of 1654-55 in Jacksonport, at the time a Potawatomi/Ottawa village known as Mechigan that was home to more than 3,000. Upon his return to Quebec Groseilliers reported on the abundance of the area's resources and on the multitude and character of its people. Having



been invited by the Potawatomi to visit, Catholic missionaries requested they might be permitted to plant the cross of their faith within the village, calling their first prospective mission St. Michael, chief of the Archangels. Built more than two hundred years later, Jacksonport's Catholic church was named St. Michael the Archangel.

Prior to construction of our church, Catholic residents celebrated Mass at various nearby homes. In 1875, John Reynolds was the first recorded baptism in Jacksonport at a location referred to as St. Michael's. The next year construction began on St. Michael's church. The lakefront location, including the cemetery site, was donated by the Charles Reynolds family. Early St. Michael's member families included LeClair, Londo, Cardy, DesJardine, LeMere, Butler, Campbell, O'Brien, LaPlante, Lautenbach, Orthober, and Searth. Many of these families still have a presence in Jacksonport. Leona (Cote) Grovogel attended Mass here for 100 years, from 1899-1999.
